Chairman's Corner, *by Brien Kocher*

One of the biggest challenges local governments face is maintaining the local road system and funding infrastructure improvements. Bushkill Township continued to repair the 57 miles of Township roads in 2017. As part of the long term road improvement plan, Recon Construction Incorporated was awarded the bid to perform Full Depth Reclamation (FDR) on Poplarwood, Cherrywood, Woodsedge, Lynnwood, and Maplewood Roads. The FDR process mills the existing asphalt and injects a predetermined amount of cement, reapplying the base course, and preparing it for the final wearing (top) course. For preventative maintenance on last year's FDR project, slurry seal was completed on Golden Eagle and Beaver Run Roads. In addition to shoulder restoration throughout the Township, paving was also completed on Hall Road, Arthur's Court, Fehr Road and other areas throughout the Township. Bushkill Township anticipates receiving \$345,000 in State Liquid Fuels funding in 2018 to continue repairs and maintenance on municipally owned roads throughout the Township. Bushkill Township also continued to improve recreational opportunities for its residents in 2017. The 90-acre Ballas Park located on Kromer Road was planted with a 34-acre meadow and construction of the perimeter trail system concluded. The site now provides both passive and active recreational opportunities including hiking, birding, fishing, and outdoor recreation. Heintzelman Park, located on Beil Avenue, was improved in 2017 with the addition of a parking area and trail along the fishing pond. Bushkill Township maintains these pocket parks, and residents are reminded that there are Rules and Regulations for the Ballas and Heintzelman Parks, and we ask that residents do their part to keep these parks clean and appealing for all users. The following are some common rules that apply:

- **Parks are closed from dusk to dawn.**
- **Littering is strictly prohibited. What you take in take out.**
- **Dogs must be on leashes at all times.**
- **The following are strictly prohibited: Boating, camping, fires, and alcoholic beverages.**

In addition to the local park systems, residents are reminded that they can visit www.GetoutdoorsPA.org to get up to date information on outdoor events and activities throughout the Commonwealth.

A Message from Public Works.....Snow plowing on all Township roads begins after 2 inches of snow have fallen. If an accumulation of snow is in the forecast, be on the safe side and remove your cars from the street. Anytime snow plows are dispatched during a snowstorm, parking is prohibited on all Township roads, except in areas where no off-street parking is available. In those areas without off-street parking, all motor vehicles shall be parked on the even address side of the street on even numbered calendar days, and on the odd address side on odd numbered calendar days. Please do not park in cul-de-sacs during snowstorms. Any vehicles parked on the street during a snowstorm may be towed and fined. The Township's snow removal procedure calls for snow emergency routes to be plowed and salted, first. This is to ensure that all developments can be accessed by emergency vehicles (fire, police, and ambulance). During heavier snowstorms, snow emergency roads will be completely cleared prior to equipment starting to plow secondary roads. Should you have a non-medical emergency during a snowstorm, please contact the Bushkill Township Police Department at 610.759.2200. For medical emergencies, please dial 911.

Mailbox Policy During Snowplowing Events

- Any installation within the Township road rights-of-way, including mailboxes and parked cars, are placed solely at the owner's risk.
- Bushkill Township does not repair or replace any mailboxes or posts damaged by snowplowing operations. Residents are reminded that snow being discharged from a plow truck can generate enough force to knock down posts and mailboxes.

This year, we welcomed Major Timothy I. Page and the Louis E. Dieruff High School Junior Cadets of the Air Force Junior Reserve Officer Training Corps., who served as our Honor Guard. Other participants included Girl Scout Troop 8609, Sam Miller, Susan Kirk, and Scoutmaster Scott Backer and members of Boy Scout Troop 44, who presented the Flag Retirement Ceremony. Randy Baxendale closed the program with "Taps." Sincere thanks are extended to everyone who helped with planning, set-up, and the program that honors both living and deceased Veterans. Note...twelve flags were dedicated to members of Nazareth High School Class of 1966 marking each branch of service for their living and deceased Veterans. These flags are displayed at the entrance to our recreation complex.

Tax Collector Reminders - Bushkill Township real estate and utility assessment bills are mailed each year by March 1. The bills are mailed by Dale C. Lieberman, Bushkill Township Tax Collector (610-759-6784 or by email at dlieberman122@yahoo.com). It is the responsibility of the homeowner to send a copy of real estate tax bills to their mortgage company, if required. The amount of your real estate tax bill is calculated by using approved millage rates and the assessed value of your property. Please call Northampton County Assessment Office at 610-829-6171 if you have questions concerning the assessed value of your property. If you recently constructed your home, you could receive interim tax bills for County, Township and/or school real estate taxes. Interim bills are essentially a back-billing for the number of months which you had use of your newly constructed home/renovation, but the increase in assessment was not included in a previous regular cycled bill. Local income tax forms and/or questions should be directed to the Keystone Collections tax agency. Forms can be requested by calling (724-978-0300) or downloaded from their website (www.keystonecollects.com). Please make sure your employer has your municipality as Bushkill Township, so the accurate earned income tax rate is deducted from your paycheck (1.45%).

Applications and information related to the Homestead/Farmstead Exclusion Program can be obtained by calling Northampton County Tax Assessment Office at 610-829-6171. To qualify, the following must apply to your property: the property must be your primary residence; you or your spouse cannot receive a homestead tax reduction from any other county or state; and if you own a farm, your home and outside buildings will qualify for the reduction but the farmland will not. The Homestead/Farmstead Act reduction will appear on your Nazareth Area School District real estate tax bill and will be clearly marked as "Homestead Reduction."

MS4 Program—Leaf Collection for “Urbanized Areas”

As part of the federally mandated MS4 Program, which focuses on management of stormwater from municipal-owned properties and rights-of-way, Bushkill Township is required to provide leaf collection from “Urbanized Areas” within the Township. MS4 stands for “Municipal Separate Storm Sewer Systems,” and the Urbanized Areas are designated by the federal government based on higher population densities (based on the 2010 Census). Leaf collection is a very costly venture for the Township and its residents, and therefore is only being provided in the Urbanized Areas, as mandated. Bushkill Township has been and will continue to be a relatively rural township based on our Nazareth Area Multi-Municipal Comprehensive Plan. Wherever possible, even in Urbanized Areas, it is best for residents to compost their leaves in upland (non-wetland) areas of their properties. Doing so will help reduce costs to all Township residents and will keep valuable organic matter and nutrients on the land from which they came. The sole intent of the leaf collection program is to keep organic matter and nutrients from getting into stormwater and local streams in high density areas where composting on-property is simply not feasible. Collected leaves will be hauled to the First Regional Compost Authority facility where they will be processed and returned to the Township for re-use. **Residents in Urbanized Areas, as well as non-urbanized areas, are encouraged to compost their leaves to help control costs.**

If you live in an Urbanized Area within the Township and need to have leaf pick-up, it will be done based on the schedule listed below. Residents of Bushkill Township are required to abide by the following regulations governing leaf collection: 1) Residents must place their leaves along the edge of the street and it is the responsibility of the resident to protect their leaves so they do not blow throughout the neighborhood. **It is not the responsibility of the Township collection crew to empty plastic bags or containers; this is the responsibility of the resident. Branches, grass clippings, shrubbery, garbage, and building material will not be collected and will be left behind.** 2) Please do not use bricks, rocks, etc. to hold tarps on top of your leaf pile. They can get mixed into the pile and vacuumed-up by the equipment.

With the increasing number of maturing trees each year, it is impossible to guarantee a specific pick-up day for any one location. If the leaves are not in place when the crew goes by, they will be picked-up on the next rotation, or residents can take their leaves to the public works yard waste facility on Clearfield Road. The schedule is subject to inclement weather and mechanical breakdown, and your area could be skipped at any time should these situations occur. Leaf collection will tentatively follow the schedule below:

Area 1 Boundary – Beginning at the Moore Township/Bushkill Township border, State Route 512, Miller, Bushkill Center, West Douglasville, Clearfield, Hahn, and Williams Roads. If you live within these boundaries, your leaves will be picked up during the fourth week of October and the third week of November.

Area 2 Boundary – Beginning on Miller, Baron, Keller, Gold Mill, Parkland, Renaldi, State Park, Jacobsburg, Henry, and Schoeneck Roads and ending at Bushkill Center Road. If you live within these boundaries, your leaves will be picked up during the first week of November and the fourth week of November

Area 3 Boundary – Beginning at Williams, Hahn, West Douglasville, Bushkill Center, Beil, High, Gower, and Knauss Roads and ending with Bok Road. If you live within these boundaries, your leaves will be picked up during the second week of November and the second week of December.

The remainder of December will be used to collect leaves throughout the Township, on an as needed basis. Questions regarding leaf collection can be referred to the Bushkill Township Public Works Department at 610.759.2758, between the hours of 7:00am to 3:00pm.

There are phone and computer applications “apps” all over the internet that are being used for “caller ID spoofing.” These apps ultimately make phone calls 100 percent untraceable and are being marketed as fun and totally legal.

Caller ID lets consumers avoid unwanted phone calls by displaying caller names and phone numbers, but the Caller ID feature is sometimes manipulated by spoofers who masquerade as representatives of banks, creditors, insurance companies, and even the government. Here’s how they work. A caller ID spoofing app allows you to decide what number you want to have displayed on the caller ID of the person you are calling. You can fool whomever you’re calling into thinking they’re getting a call from someone else. The caller ID on their phone displays another number, or for that matter any number that spoofer wants displayed on the caller ID.

In any case, scammers and shady business owners use this technology to deceive people. Scammers use this technology to disguise their identity, as they try to trick people into giving away valuable personal information which can then be used in fraudulent activity or sold illegally. U.S. law and Federal Communication Commission rules prohibit most types of spoofing.

What you can do if you think you’re being spoofed

You may not be able to tell right away if an incoming call is spoofed. Be careful about responding to **ANY** request for personal identifying information.



- Never give out personal information such as account numbers, Social Security Numbers, mother’s maiden name, passwords, or other identifying information in response to unexpected calls or if you are at all suspicious.
- If you get an inquiry from someone who says they represent a company or a government agency seeking personal information, hang up and call the phone number listed on your account statement, in the phone book, or on the company’s or government agency’s website to verify the authenticity of the request.
- Use caution if you are being pressured for information.
- If you have a voice mail account with your phone service, be sure to set a password for it. Some voice-mail services are preset to allow access if you call in from your own phone number. A hacker could spoof your home phone number and gain access to your voice mail if you do not set a password.

Is spoofing illegal?

Under the Truth in Calling Act, FCC rules prohibit any person or entity from transmitting misleading or inaccurate Caller ID information with the intent to defraud, cause harm, or wrongly obtain anything of value. If no harm is intended or caused, spoofing is not illegal. Anyone who is illegally spoofing can face penalties of up to \$10,000 for each violation. In some cases, spoofing can be permitted by courts for people who have legitimate reasons to hide their information, such as for investigative reasons for law enforcement purposes, victims of domestic abuse, or doctors who wish to discuss private medical matters.

Is blocking a phone number the same thing as spoofing?

Spoofing is not the same thing as blocking a phone number. FCC rules require telephone companies to make phone number blocking available and free for all calls between states (each state makes its own rules about calls that stay within the state). If you receive a phone call from an “unknown number,” that phone number has been blocked, but not necessarily spoofed. Also, you can legally block the transmission of your phone number when you make calls, so your number will appear as “unknown.”

What are the FCC rules regarding caller ID for telemarketers?

FCC rules specifically require that a telemarketer:

- Transmit or display its telephone number or the telephone number on whose behalf the call is being made, and, if possible, its name or the name of the company for which it is selling products or services.
- Display a telephone number you can call during regular business hours to ask to no longer be called. This rule applies even to companies that already have an established business relationship with you.

How do I report suspected spoofing?

If you receive a call and you suspect Caller ID information has been falsified, or if you think the rules for protecting the privacy of your telephone number have been violated, you can file a complaint with the FCC. You have multiple options for filing a complaint with the FCC:

Zoning Reminders

If you are planning an upcoming home improvement project, (e.g. addition, deck, pool, fence, shed or patio) Bushkill Township reminds residents to please contact the zoning office to obtain the necessary zoning permit and guidance regarding setbacks, height limitations, and impervious coverage regulations. In addition to building questions, the zoning office receives many inquiries throughout the year regarding the keeping of horses and other animals. As stated in the Zoning Ordinance under “Keeping of Pets,” any property owner desiring to keep a horse as a pet must have a minimum lot size of 2 acres. For each additional horse, an additional half-acre per horse is required. Any property containing 4 horses or more shall be considered a stable, for which ordinance requires a minimum of 10 acres. The guidelines for the raising of chickens on a property with less than 3 acres, as per the Keeping of Pets section of the Zoning Ordinance, is no more than 2 per acre housed outside of the principal dwelling. If the property is greater than 3 acres, the guidelines for raising chickens would fall under Section 405.Q “Keeping of Livestock.” This section also governs the number of grazing and non-grazing animals allowed. Contact the zoning office to determine what is allowed on your property if you are considering horses, livestock, fowl, or any other animals.

It is the policy of the Township that any complaints regarding zoning violations be submitted in writing. The complaint may be filed on a form available at the zoning office or via e-mail at btzoning@bushkilltownship.com. Please include the address of the property and the nature of the complaint, along with your name, address, and phone number. Noise complaints are handled by the Bushkill Township Police Department.

News From the Bushkill Township Heritage Committee

The Bushkill Township Heritage Committee volunteers continue to be hard at work promoting Bushkill Township. The committee booth features a display of vintage photos of the Township and its people, as well as educational brochures, literature, leftover 200th Anniversary Calendars from 2013 with interesting old Bushkill Township photos and historical information (\$5), and the ever-popular book written by the late James A. Wright, entitled “History of Bushkill Township Pennsylvania, 1813-2007” (\$10). Boy Scout Project

During the Fall of 2016, Michael McFarland of Boy Scout Troop 44, Bushkill Township, worked to improve his community by completing his Eagle Scout project. The project was done along the new trail at Ballas Park off Kromer Road near Wind Gap in Bushkill Township. The Township decided to make this area a park as a result of available grant funding from the state and Northampton County. This has created another picturesque recreational spot for residents and visitors to enjoy. The perimeter trail is one mile in length and is complete with scenic views and a pond for fishing and general recreation.

Michael worked with Bushkill Township to devise a plan to enhance the park and contribute to the community. With the help of his Boy Scout Troop and friends, Michael was able to build three benches, a picnic table, and five mile-markers using pressure treated wood and concrete footers. The project included planning and construction, and required approximately 110 man hours to complete. The benches were strategically placed so they are well-shaded and equally spaced, and where they provide the nicest views of this beautiful area of our Township. As a result of the successful completion of this project, Michael officially earned his Eagle Scout award on March 13, 2017. This award is the highest achievement for the Boy Scouts of America, and is earned by only 5% of all Scouts. The Eagle Award represents skills such as leadership, teamwork, goal setting, and a passion for helping the community. **Michael is very proud of this accomplishment and hopes that the residents of the Township enjoy walking along this new trail.**
