While many of us are looking forward to the end of this year's dark and very snowy winter season, it is important for us to recognize the dedicated and talented Public Works Department employees of our Township. While we were safe at home, or possibly travelling on our roadways, our Public Works Department was spending many hours away from their own homes and families to keep our roadways open and passable. Snow and ice on our roadways require heavy equipment and roadway salt spreaders, operated by our staff, to keep our travelling public safe. Please join me in thanking them for keeping our roadways open and safe during a tough winter season.



When they are not out taking care of winter roadway clearing, our Public Works Department is very busy with construction and maintenance operations on our highways, parks, and Township facilities. Roadways require a great deal of maintenance to keep them functional and safe. Our crews work on maintaining the stormwater management systems along the roadways. They replace pipes and keep road shoulders and swales open to keep stormwater off our roads. They patch potholes, replace signs, and repave bad sections of roads. Our talented staff is also capable of completely rebuilding our roads, which you may have noticed over the last several years. This is all accomplished under the professional direction of our Foreman, Mr. Peter Yotter. Peter's staff can operate the trucks, excavators, rollers, and pavers that keep our highways functioning. They also operate the leaf collection equipment that helps many of our residents during the fall.

Our parks and recreation system throughout the Township is widely used by our residents. Public Works helps mow and maintain the active recreation fields to keep them playable and professional looking. They have built trails, parking lots, and children's' play equipment. They also assist with the upkeep and operations of our passive recreational areas which are heavily used by our residents and visitors to the Township. They have built parking facilities, trails, and stormwater improvements in our Heintzleman, Ballas, Albert Ponds, and the newly added Highlands Park. If you have enjoyed the Bushkill Trail from Jacobsburg State Park up to Route 512, did you know that our Public Works crew built the entire trail, including the bridge over Sobers Run?

Performing all of this construction and maintenance work requires a great deal of equipment. This equipment must be stored and maintained. Our talented crews keep regular maintenance on our equipment and also perform maintenance well beyond the capabilities of most, saving our residents from the costly repairs of dealers and professional shops. Our Public Works Department facility is kept up-to-date and allows residents to drop off yard waste, obtain free mulch and compost, and dispose of waste oil. Safety Tips for Your Home

- Video cameras not only aid police investigations but are also a great deterrent to criminal activity. We encourage residents to install home
 - surveillance systems, many of which allow residents to check-in and monitor activity through mobile phone apps.
- Install door or window sensors. Many times access to a home is gained through an unlocked window or door.
- Prominently display your home security sign. Home burglars have admitted that they would avoid a targeted home if they observed an alarm system is installed.
- Set the environment. Keep your landscaping neatly trimmed, especially shrubs and trees surrounding your home. Do not give burglars a place to hide.
- Incorporate motion-sensor, remote-controlled and/or timed lighting into your home and your landscaping. If you have automated lighting use settings to create a "lived-in" environment.
- Store valuables in a secure place, including prescription medication.
- Remember to set your alarm when leaving the residence.

Lock it or Lose it

As the warm weather approaches, we would like to remind everyone to:

- Always secure your car doors when parking your vehicle, even for just a few minutes. It takes just a matter of seconds to enter an unsecured vehicle.
- ♦ Do not leave valuables such as purses, cell phones, laptops, packages, etc. in plain view inside your vehicle. Secure them in the glove box, center console, or trunk. Thieves will search other vehicles that are easier targets if they do not <u>see</u> anything of value in your car.
- Park in well-lighted areas at night. Light is an enemy of thieves.

Don't Be a Victim of Covid-19 Scams

As the COVID-19 pandemic continues to impact our State, we would like to warn residents about COVID-19 related scams. We have noticed an uptick of such scams in Bushkill Township. One we want to warn our residents about is unemployment compensation (UC) fraud. If you believe you are a victim of a scam, please contact our Department and the Office of Unemployment Compensation.

Scammers are utilizing personal information to apply for Pandemic Unemployment Assistance (PUA) benefits. After filing a claim in your name, scammers are then rerouting these payments to their personal bank accounts.

The Office of Unemployment Compensation offers these tips to help you protect yourself from fraud:

- Never give out your personal information over email or text message.
- ♦ Don't wire money, and always ignore the following requests:
 - Communications related to your UC benefits from someone asking for money; someone who says they can help you file for your benefits for a fee; and anyone claiming to work for Labor and Industry who says they need a fee to complete your application.
- Don't open or respond to unsolicited emails or text messages.
- Never give out your personal information on websites or social media channels, especially those that claim they can help you apply for UC benefits. Third parties can't apply for your benefits.
- Don't trust or rely on UC info from unofficial websites. Always visit <u>www.uc.pa.gov</u> for Pennsylvania unemployment program information.

It's an Honor to Serve You

I was honored to take the oath of office in early January in the state Capitol in Harrisburg and begin serving as the new state

representative for the 138th District in Northampton County.

My district office staff and I are here to help residents access state programs and services. We can help residents who have been negatively impacted by COVID-19. Residents who lost their jobs can contact our office for information about and assistance applying for unemployment compensation benefits. We also have information about programs and services available to employers who are struggling due to the economic uncertainty surrounding the global pandemic.

We can help people with PennDOT paperwork, including driver's license applications and renewals, vehicle registration applications and renewals, and other services. We also provide information about and applications for state programs, including Property Tax/Rent Rebate, PACE/PACENET prescription drug assistance and Children's Health Insurance Program (CHIP). My staff and I also can help residents navigate the state bureaucracy by connecting people with the agency or office that can help with their issue.

Residents can contact our Wind Gap office by dialing 610-746-2100 or visit us at 196 W. Moorestown Road. Our office is open Monday through Friday from 9 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. Masks are required to enter the office. Due to COVID-19 restrictions and social distancing requirements, we encourage residents to call or contact our office through the website if possible.

I encourage residents to visit my website at www.RepAnnFlood.com, where they can contact our office by clicking the "contact" tab and filling out an online form. Constituents also can sign up for our email newsletters under the "resources" tab.

I also encourage people to follow me on Facebook at www.Facebook.com/RepAnnFlood. While this is a great way to receive updates about our state government, we discourage people from using Facebook to contact us for help with government services. We cannot guarantee the security or privacy of information people submit through Facebook. We therefore ask people to please contact our office directly for assistance.

Our district office currently is collecting non-perishable food items, which we will deliver to four different local communities in upcoming months. The food will be delivered to St. John's Lutheran Church in Bath, the Salvation Army in Pen Argyl, Nazareth Food Bank in Nazareth, and Benders Mennonite Church in Plainfield Township.

We also have scheduled a blood drive at our district office on Monday, May 10. We will be holding the blood drive in cooperation with the American Red Cross. Highlights 2019-20 Senate Accomplishments

Like the lives of all Pennsylvanians, the work of the Senate was upended by the COVID-19 pandemic. In March, the Senate

shifted our agenda to mobilize a response aimed at saving lives and maintaining essential government services.

The Senate approved legislation to provide immediate assistance to keep hospitals running and make more Personal Protective Equipment available to health care workers. We voted to provide more accessible unemployment compensation for workers who lost hours or jobs due to the statewide shutdown of employers, and enacted legislation allocating federal funding for county governments, community service providers, first responders and food banks that have been impacted by the virus.

The Senate passed measures allowing counties to implement plans enabling citizens to return to work, requiring clear guidelines to be setup for employers to operate under.

As May ended, the Senate approved a five-month interim state budget to fund critical state services until the long-term impacts of the COVID-19 related shutdown of the economy was fully known and more accurate fiscal projections could be made. Full-year funding was provided for select line items, notably education and food security programs. In November, the Senate finalized the 2020-21 budget without increasing taxes, fees or debt.

The rest of the 2019-20 legislative session was equally productive. Efforts to improve public safety include new laws providing security grants to faith-based institutions and nonprofit organizations and setting significant penalties for the solicitation or advertisement of the sexual services of victims of human trafficking. To ensure that combatting crime and rehabilitating criminals are done properly, the Senate passed important policing reforms and criminal justice reforms.

Education changed when COVID-19 closed schools in 2020. The Senate responded by approving legislation setting standards ensuring students continue to learn during the emergency. Other new laws passed and provided \$60 million in school security grants, increased the amount of tax credits available for scholarship organizations under the Educational Improvement Tax Credit Program, and created the Public Higher Education Funding Commission to make college more accessible and affordable.

In addition to responding to COVID-19, the Senate enacted several health care initiatives, including better access to supplemental screenings for women at high risk for breast cancer, and expanding access to medications for Stage IV, metastatic cancers.

Work also continued to target Pennsylvania's opioid crisis, support our military veterans and give emergency responders the help they need to keep communities safe during the pandemic and beyond.

The past year illustrated how much state government can achieve when the branches work together. Serious challenges remain, as the commonwealth attempts to rebound from the health and fiscal crisis created by the pandemic. I stand ready to confront these challenges with a continuing commitment to protecting public health and preserving civil liberties.



Kenneth N. Butz Elementary School





Kenneth N. Butz, Jr. Elementary is currently a K-3 building located in Bushkill Township. Presently 398 students are enrolled. School opened in August offering our families the opportunity to enroll their children into our Blue Eagle Cyber Academy or the hybrid program which is a blended program of in-person instruction, as well as, remote learning. We currently have 115 students enrolled in Blue Eagle Cyber Academy, 274 students enrolled in our hybrid program and 9 IU 20 students in support classrooms. Recently the NASD Board of Education approved a full 5-day per week return to school for our students. This transition is planned to occur on Monday, March 22nd. Our staff are diligently working to prepare for the return of our students to the classroom while also adhering to the NASD Health and Safety Plan which can be found on the NASD website. Although many of our events and activities have been postponed due to the challenges we are facing throughout the COVID-19 pandemic, our

students are still enjoying their days in school, fostering friendships and working hard to gain new knowledge and skills at each grade level.

If you drive by Butz Elementary School, you will notice quite a bit of construction taking place. We are currently in the middle of a reconfiguration project that will welcome our 4th graders back into the elementary buildings starting in the fall of the 2021-22 school year. The district has also broadened the boundary lines for the elementary schools in order to provide the best educational opportunities in the most cost effective, least impactful manner for children keeping neighborhood integrity, building capacity, class size, and transportation considerations. In order to accommodate this transition, Butz Elementary is adding a new nurse's suite to the front of the building, along with additional classrooms and a new gymnasium being constructed at the back of the building. Behind the new addition sits an environmental center with a pavilion, outdoor classrooms and trails for our students to take their learning outdoors in the nicer weather. In addition, we have a riding railroad with approximately one mile of track for our students to enjoy for special occasions.

We eagerly await the time when we can welcome back all of our students under one roof and resume the activities and events that can be shared with our Bushkill families and community members. Until then, Butz Elementary students will continue to display the three R's we expect from them each day which are being Respectful, Responsible and Ready to Learn.

Intensive Art Workshop for Teens

Mondays & Wednesdays, April 12 through May 24 at 5:30-7:30pm excluding April 28

Learn different forms of fiber art from artist in residency Mallory Zondag,

Preserving Bushkill Township's Waterways

At the base of the Appalachian Mountains in Bushkill Township are the beginnings of two pristine Lehigh Valley streams. Beginning in the northeastern portion of the Township is Sobers Run, which is designated as an Exceptional Value (EV) stream by the Department of Environmental Protection (DEP). In this stream, because of the excep-



tional water quality, there are naturally reproducing populations of Brook Trout (Pennsylvania state fish) and Brown Trout. These fish, along with the macroinvertebrates that they eat, are great indicators of water quality. The headwaters of Bushkill Creek also begin at the base of the mountain in north-central Bushkill Township. Bushkill Creek is classified as High Quality-Cold Water Fishes (HQ-CWF), which is a slightly lower classification than EV, but the creek still has very good water quality. Throughout the Bushkill Creek, there are naturally reproducing populations of Brown Trout and the possibility of a small population of naturally reproducing Brook Trout in the headwaters.

The excellent water quality of these streams shows that Bushkill Township has clean groundwater and clean surface water runoff during rainstorms and snow melts. Stormwater runoff often carries a lot of pollutants into streams that will negatively affect water quality. Throughout the winter, road salts are one of the main pollutants that wash into the streams during rain events and snow melts. Road salts (sodium chloride) in the waterways can inhibit aquatic organisms' growth and reproduction, as well as raise the freezing temperature of the water. When using road salts, please ensure that salting equipment is calibrated correctly as to not add an unnecessary amount of salt on driveways, sidewalks, parking areas, roadways, etc. Two other pollutants that frequently enter our waterways and have a negative effect on water quality are sediments and fertilizers. These pollutants typically come from agricultural fields and lawns. Fertilizers cause an abundance of nitrogen and phosphorus in the water, which causes algal blooms degrades aquatic habitats. Algal blooms deplete the level of oxygen in the water necessary for other organisms to survive. Many homeowners use fertilizers, pesticides, and herbicides on their lawns and around their homes to remove unwanted pests and to fertilize their lawn. These chemicals will eventually be carried into streams and other waterways during storm events. Stormwater runoff also causes erosion when there is nothing stabilizing the ground. Runoff then carries the eroded sediment, which is considered a pollutant, into waterways where it eventually settles to the bottom and covers the streams natural substrate in which aquatic organisms live. The covering of this substrate eliminates habitat necessary for macroinvertebrates to live. Without the macroinvertebrates, the fish in the streams do not have any food and the streams become lifeless. Homeowners can minimize these effects by installing plants and stormwater facilities to help filter out these harmful pollutants and protect our waterways. Properly placed native grasses and plants, rather than having all manicured lawn, will allow stormwater runoff from impervious surfaces such as rooftops, driveways, and sidewalks, to infiltrate into the ground and filter out pollutants. These plantings can be strategically placed to complement the areas of lawn. Raingardens and bioretention swales can also be installed to effectively manage and filter stormwater. These stormwater structures are typically planted with native vegetation and flowering plants that will allow the infiltration and filtering of stormwater. Another way to keep our waterways healthy is by limiting the use of chemicals such as herbicides, pesticides, and fertilizers as much as possible and only use them when absolutely necessary.

Natural buffers are one of the best solutions to stream pollution. Buffers filter the surface water runoff and groundwater before it enters the waterways. These natural buffers contain native grasses, shrubs, and trees that stabilize the streambanks to prevent erosion and allow pollutants to be filtered out. The wider the buffer, the better its filtering capacity. Bushkill Township has established a natural buffer around the Township-owned ponds to prevent shoreline erosion and to filter out pollutants.

Open Space Program Update

Bushkill Township's Open Space program has been a model to other municipalities in the area for years. In 2020 Bushkill Township received the "Government Leadership Award" from WeConservePA. This award recognizes counties and municipalities for their commitment to conservation. The vision of Bushkill Township's Open Space program is to preserve the critical natural resources within the Township. The program aims to preserve areas such as woodlands, farmland, riparian (streamside) buffers, streams, wetlands, and scenic vistas. Since the Program's inception in 2007, Bushkill Township has preserved approximately 1,500 acres through conservation easements and fee simple purchases. Recently, several properties were purchased through the Open Space Program to keep them as open space. In December of 2019, Highlands Park (70 acres) on Broad Road was purchased. In 2020, three more properties were purchased, including 73 acres along Knauss Road and the and two properties adjacent to each other off of Old Allentown Road (8 acres total). Several of the properties purchased through the Open Space Program have a plan to hold them long-term and public use as passive recreation parks with trails and other low-impact outdoor activities. The other properties purchased have a short-term plan, which means that the Township purchases the land to place a Conservation Easement on the property and preserve it in perpetuity. The goal is then to sell this land, potentially allowing one home to promote ongoing agricultural use. If you are interested in preserving your property through the Bushkill Township Open

Bushkill Township currently owns three passive recreation parks and there is a fourth park in the planning stage. The three current parks are Albert Ponds, Ballas Park, and Heintzelman Park. All three of these parks have ponds with trails around them and beautiful vistas. Catch -and-release fishing is allowed at all of our ponds, and unpowered boats, such as canoes, kayaks, and rowboats are allowed on




the largest pond at Albert Ponds. The pond at Heintzelman is 1.9 acres and contains largemouth bass, bluegill, crappie, perch, and grass carp. Ballas Park's pond is 1.5 acres and contains largemouth bass, bluegill, crappie, perch, channel catfish, common carp, and stocked trout. The two ponds at Albert Ponds are 11.5 acres and 5.5 acres and contain largemouth bass, bluegill, crappie, perch, pickerel, and channel catfish.

There are currently 3.17 miles of Township-owned trails open for hiking, biking, running, and wildlife viewing. Jacobsburg State Park and the Appalachian Trail also run through the Township and add several more miles of open trail for public use. Bushkill Township plans to add several more miles of trails in the near future. A few Township owned properties have been enrolled in the Hunter Access Program in cooperation with the Pennsylvania Game Commission. For the 2021-2022 hunting season, only 100 permits will be given out on a "first come, first served" basis. Applications will be available at the Bushkill Township Municipal Building on August 2, 2021 for the 2021-2022 Season.

Social Distancing: We ask guests to maintain 6-feet of social distancing while visiting our site. Signs will assist with this effort.



Public Works/Yard Waste

ROAD WORK — Please keep a lookout for our Public Works Department working on roads this spring and summer. For safety reasons, please respect all signs directing traffic and closing roads. Please do not attempt to drive around work areas if the road is closed.

YARD WASTE — All Bushkill Township residents can drop off yard waste at our local collection facility at 897 Clearfield Road. A free permit is required and can be obtained at the Township Office during regular business hours. For safety and security, the Township buildings and collection facility are under surveillance 24/7. All commercial businesses and contractors must drop off at the Central Processing Center at 6701 Weaversville Road, Northampton, PA 18067 (in East Allen Township). All grass clippings must be taken to the Central Processing Center, as they cannot be accepted at our local facility.

The local facility can accept:

Branches (no more than 4 inches in diameter/5 feet long)
Leaves (loose or in brown bags designed for leaves)
Christmas trees (free of tinsel, lights, and ornaments)
Small brush, hedge trimmings, garden plant residue
The local facility cannot accept:

Grass clippings Lumber Sod

Large woody debris Plastic/other synthetic materials
