Chairman's Corner

Moving into warmer weather, the Township is continuing with our 2022 plans and goals. We are fortunate to have emerged from the state-mandated lockdowns and restrictions in fine financial shape, and I can report that we are operating at full staff. Throughout the pandemic, the Township continued to operate and provide the services that you depend on. Our administration has worked to bring back the Township Clean-up Day at the Lucas Lane parking lot this spring. Also, the Township will be hosting its first ever electronics recycling event. Your Board of Supervisors and administrative staff are planning for a successful and busy 2022.



Our Public Works Department will be continuing to operate the yard waste drop-off site at the Public Works Department facility on Clearfield Road so that you can bring yard waste generated during spring clean-up operations around your property. Public Works Department personnel will be out patching the roadways damaged by winter weather. In the summer, they will be continuing the roadway re-paving program we instituted to fix our roads using our own staff to save money, which allows us to re-pave more roads than we would if we had to contract-out the work. We will be entering into a Township-wide roadway evaluation program to inventory all Township roads and rank them in terms of need for rehabilitation and paving work.

Our Planning and Zoning Department will be working on the adoption of an updated multi-municipal comprehensive plan with 10 of our neighboring municipalities. Once accomplished, we will update our ordinances to be consistent with this new plan, all with the goal of keeping the Township rural and a great place to live, work, and play.

Our Police Department continues to patrol our roadways 24/7 to ensure that we are well-served and that help is just a phone call away. The Department continues to evaluate its equipment needs to provide top quality service that our residents expect. The Department has done a great job securing grants to keep our patrol fleet modern and reliable. Our officers continue training to better serve you and remain current on law enforcement procedures.

Our Recreation Board and staff will be preparing our Recreation Complex for all of the organized sports teams that will be playing and practicing in our spring and summer seasons. This is the first year of the combined baseball organization with players from most of the Nazareth School District municipalities; so all of our fields will be quite busy. We will continue to develop the rest of the areas in the Recreation Complex as well, so that the playground, tennis courts, basketball court, walking paths, and other amenities can be enjoyed by all users and visitors.

Our Open Space Department continues to maintain our four primary Preserves and to improve them for your enjoyment of their open space and environmental features. During 2022, we hope to complete the trail connection from our Ballas Preserve trail system to our main Township Trail! We are also beginning work on the trail that will extend from Henry Road to Filetown Road and connect into the Jacobsburg State Park trail system. Although the Board has no plans to acquire any additional public use preserve areas, we will continue to preserve land and protect our valuable open spaces in accordance with our Township Open Space Plan.

We also plan to continuing working with all of our partners, like Jacobsburg Historic Society, Jacobsburg State Park, Bushkill Township Volunteer Fire Co, and our state elected officials, to better serve our residents and taxpayers. We have a special "thank you" to Senator Mario Scavello who has announced his retirement this year. His many years of service to our Township are recognized, and he will be greatly missed. We wish him well in retirement.

Severe Weather Ready



Prepare in advance for severe weather and practice your emergency plan for severe weather scenarios. Make sure all family members are aware of where emergency supplies are located and how to turn off the water, gas, and electricity in your home. Weather is unpredictable and taking the proper precau-

tions can assist with making sure you are prepared when severe weather hits. Planning for thunderstorms, lightning, tornadoes, and flooding requires specific safety precautions. Build an emergency kit with some of the recommended items listed below to be prepared when severe weather hits:

Battery-operated flashlight, battery-operated NOAA Weather Radio, and extra batteries; emergency evacuation or shelter plan; list of important personal information; First Aid Kit (Customize your first aid kit to meet your individual and family needs); supply of bottled water and nonperishable food for 3-5 days; personal hygiene items; and blankets, pillows, or sleeping bags.





Speeding on local roads is among the most common complaints received by Bushkill Township, annually. And it's not just a problem on our "major" roads like Route 512,

Cherryhill Road, Bushkill Center Road, and Jacobsburg Road. Speeders are also found on quiet streets and cul-de-sacs – roadways mostly traveled by folks who live in these

neighborhoods. So, if drivers know the dangers of speeding, why do some drivers speed when they're so close to home, placing their neighbors in harm's way? Interestingly, psychology partly explains this behavior. By traveling the same roads, time and time again, drivers "master" roadway conditions, learning every twist, turn and dip along the route. And when drivers feel this comfortable with their surroundings, they are more likely to feel safe driving at higher speeds. This explains why most drivers travel at a slower speed when navigating through a city or town for the first time. So, when traveling local roads, please stay mindful of your speed...even if it feels safe to travel a bit faster. After all, local roads are where the people we care about most live!

Outdoor burning in Bushkill Township

As springtime approaches, many residents will find themselves clearing brush and branches. Residents are encouraged to bring brush and branches up to 6 inches thick to the Bushkill Township Public Works Department (897 Clearfield Road)

Residents are allowed to have/use:

- small outdoor fire pits
- outdoor fireplaces
- charcoal grills

Although permitted, you should be mindful of burning bans and weather that can blow fire and embers outside of your burning area. You should contact the Fire Chief for permission for bonfires or open burns. A failure to get permission or a fire complaint may result in a fine.

While we want you to enjoy your campfire, here are some additional rules to be sure to follow:

- * **NO** burning during a Township or County-wide burn ban
- * NO burning on days where winds are over 10 miles per hour
- * NO burning during Fire Weather Watch days
- NO burning during RED FLAG WARNING days
- * NO burning within 50 feet of any building/property line unless permitted by the Fire Chief
- * NO burning in streets, sidewalks, alleys, or public grounds of the Township
- * NO burning of plastics, tires, or synthetic fabrics (natural materials only, such as wood)
- * NO industrial or commercial burning at ANY time
- * NO burning within 50 feet of Jacobsburg State Park or State Game Lands.
- * NO burning North of Mountain Road or Old Allentown Road unless permitted by the Fire Chief
- * **ALWAYS** have a garden hose, shovel, or heavy equipment nearby to extinguish any spot fires or quickly contain a fire out of control. **NEVER LEAVE A FIRE UNATTENDED!**

Apply Now for 2021 Property Tax & Rent Rebate

Eligible Pennsylvania residents are reminded to apply to the Property Tax/Rent Rebate Program to claim rebates on property taxes or rent paid in 2021. Remember – you do not need to pay anyone for assistance to apply for the rebates. Help is available from my district office at no charge. For more information, please call 610.746.2100. The office is located at 196 West Moorestown Road in Wind Gap.

The rebate program benefits eligible residents age 65 and older; widows and widowers age 50 and older; and people with disabilities age 18 and older. The income limit is \$35,000/year for homeowners and \$15,000/annually for renters, and half of Social Security income is excluded.

The maximum standard rebate is \$650, but supplemental rebates for certain qualifying homeowners can boost rebates to \$975. The Revenue Department automatically calculates supplemental rebates for qualifying homeowners.

The deadline to apply for a rebate is June 30. Rebates will be distributed beginning July 1, as required by law. Additional information, as well as claim forms, can be found on the Department of Revenue website,

www.revenue.pa.gov.

Since the Program's inception in 1971, older adults and those with disabilities have received more than \$7.1 billion in property tax and rent relief. The Program is funded by the Pennsylvania Lottery and revenue from slots gaming.



Highlights 2019-20 Senate Accomplishments

In February, the Legislative Reapportionment Commission (LRC) voted on and adopted the Final Reapportionment Plan for the Pennsyl-



vania House of Representatives and Pennsylvania Senate. The Constitution of Pennsylvania requires that the legislative districts for the House of Representatives and the State Senate be redrawn each decade following the federal census. This process is mandated by the Pennsylvania Constitution so that each citizen's vote ultimately carries the same weight in the ballot box.

Article 2, Section 17 of the Pennsylvania Constitution provides for the LRC to redistrict both chambers (the state Senate and the state House) in the year following the Federal decennial census. The Commission consists of five members: the four caucus floor leaders, or deputies appointed by each of them, and a chairman to be selected by those members or, if they cannot reach agreement, by the Pennsylvania Supreme Court.

As approved, the new map for the 40th Senate District will no longer include Bushkill Township. This decision was not mine as the new district maps are voted on solely by the five member LRC. Under the approved plan Bushkill Township will fall in the 18th Senate District and the 138th House District. The 18th Senate District is currently represented by Senator Lisa Boscola. The 138th House District is currently represented by State Representative Ann Flood (who currently represents you in the House). Both seats will be on the ballot this year.

So, what does this all mean in the end?

Regrettably, it means that after the November election, I will no longer be your State Senator. It has been my absolute pleasure and honor to represent the residents of Bushkill Township in the Senate for these past two terms. I have enjoyed getting to know the people, Township Supervisors, and the beautiful area.

However, rest assured that until the end of November, I and my staff will remain here to serve you in any way we can. My Pen Argyl District Office will remain open, and we will continue to offer the same high quality legislative service that we always have. 



YARD WASTE — All Bushkill Township residents can drop off yard waste at our local collection facility at 897 Clearfield Road. A free permit is required and can be obtained at the Township Office during regular business hours. For safety and security, the Township buildings and collection facility are under surveillance 24/7. All commercial businesses and contractors must drop off at the Central Processing Center at 6701 Weaversville Road, Northampton, PA 18067 (in East Allen Township). All grass clippings must be taken to the Central Processing Center, as they cannot be accepted at our local facility.

Branches (no more than 4 inches in diameter/5 feet long) Leaves (loose or in brown bags designed for leaves) Christmas trees (free of tinsel, lights, and ornaments) Small brush, hedge trimmings, garden plant residue

The local facility <u>cannot</u> accept:

Grass clippings Lumber Sod

Large woody debris Plastic/other synthetic materials

Ornamental grasses








Rain Barrels for Sale

During a rain event, there is a lot of rainwater that flows off roofs, driveways, and other impervious surfaces. When flowing over these impervious surfaces, the water can pick up a lot of debris and unwanted chemicals that will eventually end up in our waterways. Runoff can also cause erosion in areas when large amounts leave impervious surfaces at high velocities. This contributes sediments, organics, and other pollutants into our waterways, which may be harmful for aquatic life and water quality. Rain Barrels are a great way to capture and store some of this rainwater for later use, helping to reduce the amount of runoff from impervious surfaces.

A rain barrels has a small opening in the top that allows rainwater from a downspout to flow into it. There is a screen in this opening to prevent debris and insects from entering the barrel. Without this screen debris can clog the outflow and cause harmful bacteria to grow. Mosquitoes could also enter the barrel and breed if there is not a screen over the opening. An outflow valve at the bottom of the barrel allows for use of captured rainwater. An overflow is installed near the top of the barrel so



that it does not fill completely. A hose can be attached to this overflow to allow the water to be discharged away from the barrel and act as a normal downspout would. This overflow can be installed on the right or left side of the barrel to direct water away from the home or building.

The water that has been captured can be used to water house plants, the garden, or other areas. This is a great alternative to using the garden hose and potable water from the home, helping to save money and conserve drinking water.

Bushkill Township has rain barrels for sale at our annual Clean-up Day and at the Township Municipal Building for \$15. They can be purchased assembled or they can be assembled at home. The kit comes with a barrel, outflow valve, inlet with screen for the top of the barrel, and the overflow. Please contact the Bushkill Township Open Space Coordinator, Kerry Reider, at 610.759.1250, if you would like to purchase a rain barrel.



Why is it Important to pick up dog waste?

Dog Waste is not only unpleasant to step in when walking on a trail, but is also an environmental hazard. It can contain bacteria, pathogens, and parasites that can cause humans and other animals to get sick. Rainwa-



ter can wash dog waste into waterways, which causes these harmful excrements to travel even farther. Once the waste enters a waterway, it contributes unwanted nutrients that can eventually cause harmful algal blooms which can kill fish and other aquatic organisms. Even after the waste has been washed away, microorganisms such as roundworms and E.Coli can remain in the soil in that area.

Bushkill Township provides dog waste bags and garbage cans at all of our passive recreation preserves and walking trails. Please take a bag if taking your dog out for a walk and use the garbage cans to dispose of used bags.

There have been reports of a lot of other wildlife waste on our trails as well. Please be aware that foxes, coyotes, raccoons, rabbits, deer, and other wildlife may like the open areas of the trail to excrete their waste. Trail users can help to limit the waste on the trails by picking up their pet's waste and disposing it properly.



Dog Friendly Recreation Areas

In Bushkill Township, we have two basic types of recreation areas—active parks and passive preserves. The passive use areas include all of our open space preserves and our walking trail off of Route 512. These areas all allow dogs, provided they are leashed. Dog waste stations are available at each location. Our recreation complex across from the Township Building on Bushkill Center Road is an active park. It includes ball fields, playgrounds, pavilions, etc. These types of activities produce many people in tight quarters, often children that are playing and running around. Any dog, even the most well-behaved, can be surprised and react badly. With the exception of service animals, dogs are not permitted in our Recreation Complex, per ordinance which was passed in 1988. All rules and regulations for our active and passive recreation areas are posted at each location. You are welcome to enjoy our passive preserves with your furry friends!
